# Member's Corner... Getting to know Joanne Bruno

Joanne's family settled in what is now present-day Solano County in the 1840's. She and her family are true native Californians. The Pena and Vaca families are descendants of Florida and Mexico traveled together from New Mexico to Alta California via the the Olde Spanish trail which terminated in Los Angeles. From the Los Angeles basin, they traveled north on the El Camino Real and settled in what became Vaca Valley,

which included Vacaville, Suisun, Fairfield and Dixon. Both the Penas and the Vacas families are considered the first to settlers in the region. Receiving a land grant in 1845, from Governor Pio Pico, the acreage was called the Rancho Los Putos. The famous Pena Adobe, erected in 1842, is an historic site today. Joanne's mother, a member of the Pena family, was born there. Sadly, the families were swindled out of some of the land, other acreage was lost to gambling and failure to pay taxes and many acres were sold to private parties.

Joanne's family moved to San Francisco and then to Marin County, California, where she was born. She attended Marin Catholic High School in Greenbrae, where she met her husband Bruce. She went to school at Seattle University, for two years, then returned to Marin. She earned a teaching credential from Dominican College in San Rafael, California. While Joanne began teaching, Bruce graduated from dental school and immediately joined the Air Force. He and a group of colleagues enlisted as dentists rather than be drafted to Viet Nam as medics. The base they were sent to was such an awful place that all the helicopter pilots voluteered to go to Viet Nam rather than stay there. After President Kennedy's was assination, the base was locked down.

After two years of teaching, Joanne became pregnant with twins. She and Bruce had their third child right after the twins, three babies under thirteen months. Suffice it to say, she stopped teaching. Five years later they welcomed their fourth child.

The Brunos came to the Monterey Bay area thinking Bruce was going to purchase a retiring dentist's practice in Carmel. But it had been sold shortly before they arrived. Fortunately another opportunity presented itself and he was able to take over a different practice in Watsonville, not an established one but they built it up. Joanne started working in Bruce's office initially to help with the insurance claims, then managed the office until he retired. The family moved to Rio Del Mar while building their home in La Selva Beach in 1967.

Joanne had a little experience playing party bridge. But she really began enjoying it when she began playing duplicate bridge. She was taught by a woman named Rollie Allen Ronnie, a bridge club member. Ronnie was an interesting character, being a crossword puzzle writer for the New York Times and excellent at bridge. Joanne also took lessons from Nancy Wainer on Tuesday evenings in Soquel.

Joanne thinks she started playing bridge more consistently in the early 90's. Once her children grew up, into and their college years, and Bruce's practice didn't need her to help with the insurance and management quite as much. She could devote more time to bridge and tennis volunteering and water aerobics.

The most fun Joanne remembers having was playing in the gold knockouts in tournaments. The teams included Vickie Coleman, Diana Schilling, Susan Benich, Mary Peterson, Elena Laborda-Bishop and John Hadley. Knockouts were fun but very draining. The teams started morning play and returned at 7 P.M in the evening late at night and returned to play again early the following morning.

Joanne has been a member at the Santa Cruz Bridge Club for over twenty years. She is happiest meeting many different people she wouldn't have had the opportunity to meet otherwise.

Joanne's advice to beginners is to remember not everyone is going to be a top notch player. Do the best you can and enjoy the successes that come your way.


